

THE EARLY SPREAD OF THE GOSPEL

Alexander the Great conquers a large area of Europe and Asia and unifies it under the Greek language and customs

This becomes the Roman Empire that is unified with safe roads & trade

Hebrew communities live throughout the Empire because of the Babylonian exile, years before Alexander the Great

Hebrew scholars translate the Old Testament into Greek

Safe roads allow early Christians to travel with a ready-made Greek text to existing Hebrew communities

The Gospel is spread far and wide

The Roman Empire in 1st Century

Relied on each other to prevent deception

What sort of deceptions or cultural practices is the church susceptible to today?

⁷ For many deceivers have gone out into the world, those who do not confess the coming of Jesus Christ in the flesh. Such a one is the deceiver and the antichrist. 8 Watch yourselves, so that you may not lose what we have worked for, but may win a full reward.

⁹ Everyone who goes on ahead and does not abide in the teaching of Christ, does not have God.
Whoever abides in the teaching has both the Father and the Son.

¹⁰ If anyone comes to you and does not bring this teaching, do not receive him into your house or give him any greeting, ¹¹ for whoever greets him takes part in his wicked works.

APOSTOLIC SUCCESSION

Jesus>Apostles>their successors>their successors...

Preserves the truth of the apostolic message

Clement of Rome writes on the importance of unity in the church and submission to leaders

⁵⁴ Now when they heard these things they were enraged, and they ground their teeth at him. 55 But he, full of the Holy Spirit, gazed into heaven and saw the glory of God, and Jesus standing at the right hand of God.

⁵⁶ And he said, "Behold, I see the heavens opened, and the Son of Man standing at the right hand of God." 57 But they cried out with a loud voice and stopped their ears and rushed together at him.

⁵⁸ Then they cast him out of the city and stoned him. And the witnesses laid down their garments at the feet of a young man named Saul. ⁵⁹ And as they were stoning Stephen, he called out, "Lord Jesus, receive my spirit."

And falling to his knees he cried out with a loud voice, "Lord, do not hold this sin against them." And when he had said this, he fell asleep.

POLYCARP

Bishop of Smyrna

Disciple of the Apostle John

Martyred in 155 AD

"Martyrdom of Polycarp" written to other churches to tell about Polycarp's death & encourage them

And being about evening [to the place where he was], they found him lying down in the upper room of a certain little house, from which he might have escaped into another place; but he refused, saying, "The will of Gods be done."

So when he heard that they were come, he went down and spake with them. And as those that were present marvelled at his age and constancy, some of them said "Was so much effort₁₀ made to capture such a venerable man?"

Immediately then, in that very hour, he ordered that something to eat and drink should be set before them, as much indeed as they cared for, while he besought them to allow him an hour to pray without disturbance.

And on their giving him leave, he stood and prayed, being full of the grace of God, so that he could not cease₁₂ for two full hours, to the astonishment of them that heard him, insomuch that many began to repent that they had come forth against so godly and venerable an old man.

ACTIONS OF POLYCARP DURING ARREST

- 1. Polycarp is about to be arrested and he has a chance to flee and does not.
- 2. He offers the soldiers who come to arrest him food and drink!
- 3. He prays! For two hours! (The next chapter says he prayed for anyone he ever met, and he prayed for the church worldwide.)
- 4. The soldiers began to repent, or be remorseful they had to arrest an old man because of the kindness he showed to them.

What do you think about Polycarp's actions? Think you could do that if the cops came to your door?

"[the proconsul] sought to persuade him to deny [Christ], saying, "Have respect to thy old age," and other similar things, according to their custom, [such as], "Swear by the fortune of Cæsar; repent, and say, Away with the Atheists." But Polycarp, gazing with a stern countenance on all the multitude of the wicked heathen then in the stadium, and waving his hand towards them, while with groans he looked up to heaven, said, "Away with the Atheists."

Polycarp declared, "Eighty and six years have I served Him, and He never did me any harm: how then can I blaspheme my King and my Saviour?"

"Thou threaten me with fire which burneth for an hour, and after a little is extinguished, but you are ignorant of the fire of the coming judgment and of eternal punishment, reserved for the ungodly. But why tarriest thou? Bring forth what thou wilt."

"Leave me as I am; for He that giveth me strength to endure the fire, will also enable me; without your securing me by nails, to remain without moving in the pile."

Let us pray that we, like Polycarp, will stand firm in the face of persecution
